"This was a Building Year"

Team Captures Third in Red Division

Although the SNGABW team finished out of the Team Play money in this year's competition, team captain, Geneva Cullen sees this as a building year.

"Originally the Business Women's Club wasn't even recognized by the other teams, now they all know who we are," she

The team ended the year on a positive note, taking 13 of the possible 24 points from Black Mountain at Boulder City on September 17th. The win left in gross points and 5th in net points in the Red Division.

The top two teams in each division in overall, gross and net points will meet October 29th at Dragon Ridge for a playoff to determine the champion.

Geneva feels the team has a great future. "We made huge strides this year," she said. "We definitely have a lot more team spirit, have become more competitive and

Although all of the ladies came to the forefront when the need arose, Geneva attributes a lot of the credit for the team's success to Karen Power.

"Karen has done so well," added Geneva. "She decreased her handicap by more than seven points over the past few months. Winning the State Partners Tournament with Lynn (King) really turned her game around."

The team opened the season in January by taking 13.5 overall points over Revere. They lost some ground in February against Spanish Trails, where they managed to come away with 6.5 overall points. March saw a determined SNGABW team as they rebounded against TCP and captured 17.5 of a possible 24 points. They didn't fare as well in May against Badlands but still managed to take 8 points overall. June was a bye month for the team. They

played host to the other teams in July at Painted Desert when they were matched against the Las Vegas Golf Club and took an overall 19.5 points.

The final match of the year pitted SNGABW against Black Mountain which they edged out by 13 points.

I'm sure she had no idea how important that idea would prove to be.


I know we are all affected differently by the tragedy: some may have had friends or relatives directly involved, others will be affected by the changes in the economy, and still others will be affected by what is to come.
